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No Wounds of Love

Dear St. Ignatius School Foundation Alumni and Families:

What a tumultuous school year 2020-2021 has been. The pandemic required our children to stay at home for online classes, our teachers to innovate, and our parents to juggle work, childcare, and family life. Our numbers fell as parents withdrew some children, which impacted our financial situation. The School Foundation provided crucial funding to keep us confident that we could pay our bills. Our teachers held strong in strenuously difficult times. And three of our senior teachers – Kathleen Downing, Kristin Jost and Jessie Wimer – shared the principal's duties when Ms. Clark departed at the end of 2020.

As the 8th grade class of 2021 graduates, the future looks bright. It looks now as if we will be back to our regular routine in the fall.

Archbishop Sample approved our selection for the new principal to be Carol Pausz, vice principal from Valley Catholic and educator with 20 years of experience in the classroom. Carol will begin her duties as our next principal on July 1st. And the Jesuit provincial has appointed Fr. Mike Moynahan S.J. to be the new pastor in January, 2022 when I will move on to a six-month sabbatical before receiving a new assignment. Mike and I studied philosophy together in Spokane, so we are classmates. Mike taught college theology and was the rector of the Jesuit community at Gonzaga University. And for the past ten years, he has been pastor of St. Ignatius Parish in Sacramento.

The children at St. Ignatius School are learning how to cope when life is difficult. Some of their favorite lessons come from stories like this one:

There's an ancient legend which says that the devil, Master of Disguise, tried to get into heaven by pretending to be the Risen Christ. He took with him his demons disguised as angels of light, and had them cry out the traditional first part of the welcome psalm: "Lift up your heads, O gates of heaven, and lift up your doors, and the King of Glory shall enter."

The real angels looked down on what they thought was their King returning in triumph from the dead. So they in turn shouted back with joy the refrain, "Who is this King of Glory?" The devil then made a fatal mistake. He opened his arms and spread his palms and declared, "I am."

The angels immediately slammed the gate of heaven and refused to let the imposter in. They saw right away that there were no nail marks in his palms. The imposter had no wounds of love, had not paid the cost.

Especially in hard times, it's good to celebrate 113 years of Holy Names and Jesuit education on the corner of SE 43rd and Powell. Graduating 8th Grade Student Reflection

For the past nine years, I have attended St. Ignatius School. These years have been filled with love, support, and a quality education. Graduate Spotlight: Adam Brown, 2016

Born and raised in Portland, Adam was the third member of his family to attend St. Ignatius School behind his mother, Annette Semper ('84) and his uncle, Felipe Semper. His cousin, Alexandra Semper('20), also attended a few years behind Adam.

When I asked Adam about his earliest memory at St. Ignatius, he went all the way back to his start in Kindergarten. He was fond of naptime and referred to his kindergarten teacher, Ms. Phyllis Collins, as "one of the greatest teachers". Fast forward a few years, and his favorite memory of all at St. Ignatius was Outdoor School. Spending time with his classmates and Mr. Beseau for that weeklong time at camp, left a lasting impression on Adam. When asked what else stood out to him as memorable during Outdoor School, he told me about the honor he received as being the person voted by his classmates to plant a tree at the end of the week.

We wanted to know how St. Ignatius has helped to shape who Adam is today. He told us that the Faith education he received while attending St. Ignatius School gave him the foundation he needed to build a strong moral compass. It taught him self-esteem, compassion, empathy and respect for others.

When I asked Adam which teacher had the greatest impact on him, he couldn't pick just one. "There were two", he told us. Mr. Beseau's love of science made it easy for him to want to learn and participate. Adam states that Mr. Beseau knows how to make science really interesting. Adam believes Mr. Beseau was the most outgoing teacher and that he really cares about his students. Adam was also greatly impacted by 8th grade teacher, Mrs. Wimer, who was very helpful when he was preparing for high school. It really meant a lot to him when she helped guide him through the process of filling out high school applications. "She cared about my choices and about my future".

At St. Ignatius School, junior high students do a yearly project for the academic fair. I asked Adam to reflect back on his junior high projects. He recalled that for the 6th grade Science Fair project he tested how different lights affected the growth rate of a sunflower. In 7th grade, for Night of the Nobles, he did his project on Guglielmo Marconi, the man who invented the radio. It was while researching Guglielmo Marconi, that Adam learned the importance of innovation. During his last year at St. Ignatius, Adam's 8th grade project was photography of graffiti street art. "Being a Portland native, I've seen street art on every corner. It made me realize that not all graffiti art is bad". Adam believes that these academic fair projects really helped prepare him for high school by helping him feel more comfortable with public speaking in large groups, how to do research and avoid plagiarism, the fun of competition in an academic setting and the necessity of time management.

When asked what impact St. Ignatius had on Adam's high school experience, Adam stated that it taught him self-discipline and how to be a responsible student. He also gained a lot from the service opportunities that students participate in while attending St. Ignatius School. Adam remembers serving at the Blanchet House, delivering meals for Meals on Wheels, and visiting retirement homes and Providence Hospital. Adam credits the teachers at St. Ignatius for teaching him how to develop great study habits, time management and the importance of serving the community.

Adam was accepted to South Oregon University in Ashland, Oregon where he will start in September 2021. He plans to earn a Bachelor's degree in Business with an emphasis on Real Estate. He knows that this will be the perfect career for his personality. "Being an only child, I've always had a knack for being able to talk to adults. I'm a people person and I enjoy meeting new people and developing new relationships".

When I asked Adam about his long term dream, he stated he wants to earn his degree, find a job with a great, steady income, and eventually settle down and start a family.
